- Writing is a tool that is used to communicate between people.
- To be able to write, you must first be able to speak, listen and read.
- Each child's writing skills evolve over time. They need to experiment and receive constructive feedback in order to improve.
- An awareness of words and symbols is the beginning of writing. This comes from reading and talking.



If you can say it, you can write it.







Vygotsky (1978) stated that individuals "grow into the intellectual life of those around them."











#### How do children become writers?



1

Listening to conversations and sounds and processing what is being heard.



Talking to people around them, especially their parents, grandparents and other family members. This builds a child's vocabulary and helps them formulate sentence structures.











#### How do children become writers?

Reading with parents and learning to love reading.
Engaging in conversations about book topics, events, characters, setting, plots, words and an author's purpose.

Read, read and read some



Experiment with writing implements such as crayons, chalk, pencils and textas.

Encourage your child to draw and then 'label' their drawings. Have conversations about their work.



Have a craft box – paper and pencils. Messy is good!

























### The Writing Process
